## A Pastor and Former Chaplain Remembers a General's Insight

I have long held the late General Omar Bradley in high esteem as one of our nation's finest military leaders – not simply for his outstanding leadership during World War II, but also for his great intellect and insightful moral wisdom. As I listen to and observe what people are saying privately on Main Street and what the media has been reporting over the past year, many of us may wonder, “how is it that we have gotten to where we are in this great land?”

This is a worthwhile question to ask. News reports about people in positions of respect, public trust and power have brought shame upon themselves and their constituents because of inappropriate behavior, as in a texting scandal that forced a congressman from his legislative seat.

In recent years political scandals, arrests and convictions of public officials on various charges of corruption have hurt not just those who were convicted, but caused many in the public to become mistrustful of those in elected or appointed positions of public trust.

Reports concerning a hotel maid's allegations of rape by a former head of the International Monetary Fund are also disturbing to many. There are numerous elements of that story which were disturbing. Among the troubling elements of that story were revelations the accused may have violated the sanctity of his marriage on other occasions and now faces allegations of sexual misconduct back in France. But, also troubling were reports that the maid's own credibility was drawn into question as investigators learned about what she had said and done.

We see how partisan politics has kept our nations from resolving important issues as those from many different places on the political horizon appear to be more concerned about promoting their particular ideologies and hold on power, than working with those with whom they differ for a greater good.

Today many of us are concerned about the destructive impact that bullying, cyber-bullying, sexting and substance abuse can have on our children and grandchildren. Stories of children and teens whose lives ended tragically break the hearts of all of us.

Now back to General Omar Bradley. He observed and said of our world: “we have grasped the mystery of the atom and rejected the Sermon on the Mount.” He also said: “The world has achieved brilliance without wisdom, power without conscience. Ours is a world of nuclear giants and ethical infants.” Years since he made those statements, there seems to be a ring of truth in his words. Recent studies reveal that Americans including those professing faith seem to know and understand little about what the Bible actually says. In many places attending worship and church school has become replaced with other more entertaining pursuits. Many people know more about baseball, soccer and football stats, than Biblical stories and their timeless lessons.

The motto of the U.S. Army Chaplains Corp is Proverbs 9:10; “The Fear of the Lord is the beginning of Wisdom.” Perhaps our nation and we in it need to reclaim our moral and spiritual compass? Perhaps it is time to affirm our need for a Wisdom that is greater than our own – a Love that cares enough to expect more and better of us all? Maybe this is a good time for all of us to return to church and church school, that together we may put first things first once again.

November 20<sup>th</sup> – Fall Cleanup – meet in church parking lot at 12:00



## DID YOU KNOW???



...that one of the ministries that we Brick Presbyterians support is the “Peacemaking Offering”?

This offering was organized following the adoption by the 192<sup>nd</sup> General Assembly of Peacemaking: The Believers Calling, which called for an emphasis on peacemaking across the Presbyterian church (USA). Make this year a time to renew your commitment to peacemaking as part of your calling as a follower of Christ, who not only taught us the ways of peace, but who is our peace. The offering helps the GA support the people around the world who are suffering from violence, war, hunger and oppression. Funds received are divided three ways: 25% to congregations, 25% to the Presbytery and Synod, and 50% to the GA. Your Mission Committee has voted that our 25% will support our Missionary Mark Hare in Haiti.

The impact of the Peacemaking Offering was felt by the Bryn Mawr Presbyterian Church in Bryn Mawr, PA when a faith-based movement to prevent gun violence was formed. The members of the Littlefield Presbyterian Church in Dearborn, MI, after hearing the words: “Let there be peace on earth, and let it begin with me”, created a culture of peace in their community. On Sunday, October 2, we are mindful of our unity with Christians everywhere. When you donate to the Peacemaking Offering on that date, you help support Presbyterians who are finding ways to work with others for peace in this country and around the world.

During 2010, you, the members and friends of this church, gave \$622 to this offering. We, the members of the Mission Committee, ask you to pray and be as generous as you can on October 2. It’s remarkable what your gift will provide, always remembering the words from “James”:  
“The harvest of justice is sown in peace”

## A LIFE WORTH SAVING CROP HUNGER WALK 2011

This morning in Manila eight year old Tomas roused himself from his bed of dirty rags and left the safety of his dark alley to face another day of scavenging for food and anything else of value that he could find. He has lived on the streets for almost a year and his life expectancy is measured in months unless he finds sanctuary where he will have safety, good food and education.



There are sanctuaries in third world cities all over the world and they are saving many street children like Tomas, but they are full. CROP Hunger Walkers have supported these sanctuaries and have saved lives and made them healthier and happier.

Again this year Hunger walkers will walk for the hungry and homeless. They will walk to make room for Tomas and all the other street urchins, knowing that each is a life worth saving and helping is worth doing.

## Health Ministry



The following information is from The National Mental Health Institute.

### How is depression diagnosed and treated?

Depression, even the most severe cases, can be effectively treated. Depression is a common but serious illness. Most that experience depression need treatment to get better. The earlier that treatment can begin the more effective it is.

The first step to getting appropriate treatment is to visit a doctor or mental health specialist. Certain medications, and some medical conditions such as viruses or a thyroid disorder, can cause the same symptoms as depression. A doctor can rule out these possibilities by doing a physical exam, interview, and lab tests. If the doctor can find no medical condition that may be causing the depression, the next step is a psychological evaluation.

The doctor may refer you to a mental health professional, who should discuss with you any family history of depression or other mental disorder, and get a complete history of your symptoms. You should discuss when your symptoms started, how long they have lasted, how severe they are, and whether they have occurred before and if so, how they were treated. The mental health professional may also ask if you are using alcohol or drugs, and if you are thinking about death or suicide.

Once diagnosed, a person with depression can be treated in several ways. The most common treatments are medication and psychotherapy.

## Depression Seminar

On Tuesday October 18<sup>th</sup> at 7 pm we will be having our second seminar in the series on Depression. Our guest speaker is Lynn Leonard MA, NCC, NCSC, LPC, a licensed clinician in private practice in Brick. This lecture will focus on identifying symptoms in oneself, family or friend & also to answer the question "*Is Depression Contagious?*"
