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Q: Why did the hawk sit on the church steeple?
A: Because it is a bird of pray! (Ba dum dum!)

One December morning I was walking to work (you know, my long commute) and I noticed two vultures sitting on the church steeple. I told them to go away – shoo! Go on now! – but they only looked at me with disdain (or so I thought). They were gone when I came back outside hours later, but their presence made me wonder what they saw from atop their lofty perch.



Then, early one January morning, I was exercising with our resident fitness guru Geoff Blake when I noticed a hawk sitting on the church steeple.

I wondered if there has ever been any meaning to vulture or hawk sightings, and indeed the internet has a lot to say about it.

According to hymnsandverses.com, <u>vultures</u> "are often associated with death and decay, their appearance can be quite unsettling. However, the Bible offers a different perspective on the significance of vultures.

"Vultures are mentioned several times throughout the Bible, both in the Old and New Testaments. These birds of prey are known for their unique feeding habits, as they consume the remains of dead animals. The Bible offers a few insights into the role that vultures play in God's plan.

"In **Leviticus 11:13-14**, God outlines the dietary restrictions for the Israelites, instructing them to avoid certain birds, including the vulture. The vulture is considered unclean, likely due to its feeding habits. This passage emphasizes **the importance of adhering to divine guidelines and maintaining spiritual purity**.

"In **Proverbs 30:17**, vultures are portrayed as instruments of divine retribution. Disrespecting one's parents is a serious offense, and the verse illustrates the consequences of such behavior. The imagery of vultures feasting on the remains serves as a **powerful reminder of the importance of honoring our parents and respecting authority.**

And in **Matthew 24:28**, "Jesus speaks these words in the context of discussing the end times. The appearance of vultures gathering around a carcass serves as a metaphor for the inevitability of judgment and the presence of God's justice. When the time comes, there will be no escaping the consequences of one's actions."

A quick dive into my Bible concordance discovers that "<u>hawks</u> are mentioned in various places throughout the Bible as well, often in relation to their keen vision, swift flight, and powerful hunting abilities. These qualities make the hawk a symbol of divine guidance, insight, and power."

For instance, in **Job 39:26-27**, "God is speaking to Job and challenging his understanding of the natural world. By using the hawk as an example, God emphasizes the magnificence of His creation and reminds Job that it is beyond human comprehension. The hawk taking flight is **a metaphor for divine wisdom and guidance**, illustrating that **it is God who directs and empowers His creatures.**

In **Proverbs 30:19**, "the wisdom writer Agur lists four mysterious and wonderful things, one of which is the flight of an eagle or a hawk. The soaring of these birds is a **symbol of God's unseen hand guiding and directing our lives.** This passage encourages us to **trust in divine guidance**, even when we can't fully comprehend it.

And in a return to **Leviticus 11, verse 16** continues the avian references in which "hawks are listed among the birds that are considered 'unclean' for the Israelites to eat. While this might seem like a negative portrayal, it's important to remember that the cultural context of the time played a role in these dietary laws.

"The prohibition against eating hawks may have served to **protect these birds and preserve their populations**, as they played an essential role in the ecosystem by controlling rodent and insect populations.

While I think that we should always be cautious about interpreting these sightings as omens or harbingers of things to come, I do believe that we can use them to remind us of their symbolism as they appear in Scripture and the insights that they can lend us. Lent is a time of introspection, reevaluation, and the cycle of Death – Resurrection – Life. This year, I am channeling these symbols in my prayer practice. Specifically, I am asking God to reveal to me:

- 1. What is now dead and can be pruned from my life?
- 2. What divine guidelines do I need to reinvest myself in?
- 3. How can I purify my focus on faith-full living?
- 4. To whose authority do I bow: God's or some earthly power?
- 5. How does God judge me? Do I trust that God will deliver true justice on my behalf? Can I let go of others' judgments of me that are not of God?
- 6. What can I do better to protect the people, creatures, and environment around me?
- 7. How can I rely on God's strength and power?
- 8. How can I cultivate spiritual vision, based on God's bird-eye view and not my own?

I hope that this reflection is helpful to you this Lenten season.

Remember that God loves you and so do I!

ONE GREAT HOUR OF SHARING



In Isaiah 58, the prophet exclaims, "Your ancient ruins shall be rebuilt; you shall raise up the foundations of many generations; you shall be called the repairer of the breach, the restorer of streets to live in" (Isaiah 58:12). As the people of Israel returned from the cloud of exile and struggled to rebuild their lives, Isaiah questioned their efforts. [Are you not called] "to share your bread with the hungry, and bring the homeless poor into your house; when you see the naked, to cover them?" (Isaiah 58:7).

Then in Matthew 25, we hear Jesus calling to us, "For I was hungry and you gave me food ... I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothing. ... As you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me" (Matthew 25:35–40).

Isaiah and Jesus are making an important theological point: faithfulness to God causes us to find solutions that will mend broken things— broken lives, broken spirits, broken hearts, broken relationships—things that happen to all of us throughout our lives.

When we give to the One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS) offering on Palm Sunday, we are combining our efforts with those across the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) to repair peoples' lives — people who are hurting, broken, oppressed, lost or on the margins of society - the exact people about whom Isaiah and Jesus are speaking. The people we are called to connect with every day, but especially in the light of the Good News of the resurrection.

We invite you to visit the OGHS website (<u>pcusa.org/oghs</u>) to find information on how your gift helps people all over the world and offer prayers for those who will receive monetary support through this offering. Small changes, when added together here and around the globe, make huge differences in the lives of our siblings in need.
